- \* Introducing new people, places, ideas, and situations

#### SYNOPSES OF THE BOOKS

#### **PRIMARY BOOKS**

#### Josephus: The Essential Works

Flavius Josphus (c. A.D. 37-100) was born to an aristocratic Jewish family, served as a priest, and later became the commander of Jewish forces in Galilee following the revolt against Rome that began A.D. 66. Captured by the Romans, Josephus spent his later life in Rome under the patronage of the Roman emperors where he composed his history of the Jewish people and his account of the Jewish war that led to the destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple in A.D. 70.

#### Aesop's Fables

Aesop's Fables is a collection of fables credited to Aesop, a slave and storyteller who lived in ancient Greece between 620 and 564 BCE. Of diverse origins, the stories associated with his name have descended to modern times through a number of sources and continue to be reinterpreted in different ways as well as artistic media.

#### **SECONDARY BOOKS**

#### The Robe by Lloyd C. Douglas

The Robe is a fictional story about what happened to the Roman, Marcellus, who won Jesus' robe at his crucifixion, and ends up joining the Christian religion, with help from his slave and friend, Demetrius.

#### Ben Hur by Lew Wallace

Ben-Hur is a story of a fictional hero named Judah Ben-Hur, a Jewish nobleman who was falsely accused and convicted of an attempted assassination of the Roman governor of Judaea and consequently enslaved by the Romans. The story's revenge plot becomes a story of compassion and forgiveness. After witnessing the Crucifixion, Judah recognizes that Christ's life stands for a goal quite different from revenge. Judah becomes Christian, inspired by love and the talk of keys to a kingdom greater than any on Earth. The novel concludes with Judah's decision to finance the Catacomb of San Calixto in Rome, where Christian martyrs are to be buried and venerated.


### Josephus: The Essential Works - answer 3 of the 4 questions (24 pts

In *Josephus: The Essential Works,* Josephus adds some interesting details to the Biblical account of the story of Israel. Explain one of those details and how it enhances your understanding of the Bible *or* what kinds of questions come to mind because of this added information. (8 pts)

In *Josephus: The Essential Works,* Josephus writes about the history of Israel in between the end of the Old Testament (roughly 400s BC - Ezra/Nehemiah/Malachi) and the beginning of the New Testament. What new insights about the history of Israel did you gain in reading this section? (8 pts)







### Aesop's Fables Assessment - answer all 3 of the prompts (24 pts possible)

Pick a fable from Aesop's collection and write your own script for it. Keep in mind that, in theater, the story should be told in dialogue (conversation between two or more characters) and action (what the characters do). Make sure that each one of your characters in the scene has a reason (a motivation) for being in the scene. Complete this on a <u>separate sheet of paper</u>. (8 pts)


